Cade Cannedy

California Environmental Justice Alliance

Cade Cannedy is graduating from the Stanford Communication Department's Journalism Master's program and holds a Bachelor's in Political Science. He will be joining the California Environmental Justice Alliance this summer where he hopes to use his skills in effective scientific communication and research to advance environmental, social, and economic justice. He hopes to draw on his background growing up in a low-income, rural community to ground his work and advocacy. He has written an undergraduate honors thesis on regulatory capture and the effects of air quality in disadvantaged communities and a Master's thesis on the future of air quality regulatory bodies in California.

This summer, he will be working on flood risk and sea level rise monitoring and prevention projects in San Mateo County, including the Colma Creek Restoration and Adaptation Project in South San Francisco and a Flood Early Warning System across the County.

Climate Resilient Communities

Taylor Malina is a first year undergraduate from Skokie, Illinois who will be working with the Climate Resilient Communities organization through their Amplifying Youth Voices and Accessing Renewable Energy program. Her work will focus on creating a student-led speaker symposium on environmental justice and climate change advocacy and awareness. Her interests focus on the intersectionality of identity and mental health, as well as environmental policy and environmental racism. Her current research focuses on the discrepancies in the legislation vs in practice regarding mining on tribal lands,

and she plans to expand her project next year to create a speaker series featuring experts in environmental justice and mining professions. As the social chair of the American Indian Science and Education Society (AISES), she plans to create and publicize this event at Stanford to spread awareness of the issue campus wide, and to promote further advocacy from the student body.
